Five states allow sex workers and sex trafficking survivors to report crimes like sex trafficking and assault without being arrested for prostitution:

# Alaska State Law, 2016, SB91

- Modifies prostitution statute to say:
  - A) A SELLER can't be charged with prostitution IF
  - B) The evidence for prostitution was gained from a good faith report that
  - C) The person with the VICTIM or WITNESS of
  - D) A short list of heinous crimes

# Anchorage Municiple Prostitution Code, 2017, A0 2017-84

 Mostly same as above, but modifies municipal prostitution code

# California, 2019, SB233

- Prohibits arrest on ANY misdemeanor sex work or drug charge for
  - A) Victims and witnesses reporting a list of serious crimes, if
  - B) The prostitution or drug conduct is related to the crime reported

## Utah, 2019, HB40

- A prosecutor may not prosecute a SELLER if
  - A) The selling was committed at or near the time that the seller
  - B) Was a victim or witness of a list of crimes and
  - C) The seller reports or attempts to report to law enforcement in good faith



## Oregon, 2019, SB596

- A) If a person contacts emergency services or law enforcement to report a "person felony" (felony level crime against a person)
- B) Any statements or evidence related to prostitution cannot be used against the person reporting

## Colorado, 2022, HB 22-1288

- A) A victim of sex trafficking OR witness of a list of crimes
- B) Is immune from arrest or prosecution for prostitution charges if
  - They report to emergency services or law enforcement or a medical provider
  - AND the evidence for the prostitution charge was obtained as a result of the person seeking, needing, or reporting assistance

Two States allow sex workers and sex trafficking survivors to report sexual assault, but not other crimes like sex trafficking or child pornography, without being charged with prostitution:

New Hampshire Montana

#### New Hampshire, 2021, HB123

- It is a defense to a prostitution charge AND
- A person shall not be arrested, charged, or convicted of prostitution IF
  - A) The person was a victim of (only) sexual assault AND
  - B) Evidence for prosecution was gained as a proximate result of the person reporting
  - Any victim seeking medical care shall receive a rape kit with no requirement of reporting to law enforcement
  - 4) This shall not be construed to limit law enforcement's ability to
    - A) seize evidence from victims of sexual assault
    - B) detain or arrest victims of crimes other than sexual assault

#### Montana, 2021, HB520

 Expands Good Samaritan law to sex workers and sex trafficking survivors reporting only sexual assault.
